2019 was another busy year for the Center! In our mission to provide education, support, and advocacy to domestic and other forms of violence, while modeling equality and power-sharing, we worked hard to ensure that clients received the best in culturally affirming, trauma-informed care. We're proud of what we've accomplished, and as we look back, we want to share some highlights with you.



Honorings & Accolades

- In recognition of their tireless efforts to provide cultural competency training and education to service providers and community members working with people from Burma, CfN advocates Ruaxoi Non and Maria Neels-Hogle were honored with a Certificate of Appreciation from the Fort Wayne chapter of the Transcultural Nursing Society.
- Latinx advocate, Gily Osuna, was appointed to the Mayor's Commission on Domestic Violence, Rape & Sexual Harassment the as the CfN representative.
- Ana Giusti, veteran staff member and CfN Latinx Support Services founder, was the
 recipient of the Lifetime Achievement Award from "Welcoming Fort Wayne," a Greater
 Fort Wayne Hispanic Chamber of Commerce initiative, for her long-standing and
 unwavering commitment to providing support and advocacy to Latinx communities.
 Additionally, she also received the St. Joe Community Health Foundation's Minette Baum
 Award for her diligent and faithful community service.
- For the second year in a row, Brandon Evans was asked to keynote the "Men's Pitch
 against Domestic Violence" a community conversation for men sponsored by the TinCaps
 Organization.
- Youth Prevention Services staff member, Tasha Sare, received the Indiana Youth Institute's
 D. Susan Wisely Youth Worker of the Year Award for the extraordinary work she has
 done in her 18 years with the Center to provide education and support to at-risk and
 underserved youth.
- Several CfN staff members, including Beth Beams, Brandon Evans, Khalilah Hanan, Elka Jackson, Juan Navarro, and Dawn Witte, were selected to facilitate sessions at the 2019 ICADV (Indiana Coalition against Domestic Violence) Annual Conference, an event that draws thousands of advocates, service providers, and experts in the field of domestic violence from across the tri-state area.

Support & Advocacy Services

 LGBTQ+ advocates delivered a series of trainings, education sessions, and workshops on a variety of issues and topics impacting LGBTQ+ community members, including suicide prevention, self-care, and support for families and loved-ones of LGBTQ+ individuals. They also raised awareness and engaged in community outreach by participating in events such as the Three Rivers Festival, Fort Wayne Pride Festival, Pride Month events, and the Trap

- Door storytelling series.
- Thanks to the hard work of our Latinx advocates, four CfN clients received U-Visas and one
 received her citizenship. This is a long, arduous process that can take years to complete, but
 Ana and Gily are always there every step of the way.

Intervention Services

- With the support of the Center's executive directorship team, adult intervention programs
 made several adjustments that enabled them to better balance an increased caseload with
 limited staff. This resulted in a more manageable workload for intervention staff and a positive,
 more productive environment for intervention clients.
- Men's Program staff member, Juan Navarro, was nominated to serve on SAT and Men's Program Facilitator, Parvielle Riggens, became a program Coordinator.
- Senior Coordinators Brandon Evans (intervention services) and Nicki Meier (support services) teamed up to facilitate DAIP's (Duluth Abuse Intervention Program) three day Batterer Intervention Training "Creating a Process of Change for Men Who Batter." For many years, this had been a training that John and Beth Beams facilitated; however, as they transitioned into retirement, they recognized the need to pass the torch to two of the Center's most capable and highly trained facilitators.
- Youth Intervention Program also saw a rise in numbers in 2019, and while it was a challenge to
 acclimate new participants with established ones, this also led to numerous opportunities for
 dynamic and engaging dialogue covering a range of topics.

Youth Prevention services

 2019 was a time of transition for the FACES Nonviolent Leadership Program, prevention services' flagship program. Staff recognized the need to create smaller, more personalized groups for FACES participants to address the needs of youth who were struggling more than others. This shift in group structure enabled staff to make greater progress with youth, meet more specialized needs, and develop fresh new activities that helped participants navigate difficult discussions around violence, race, gender dynamics, and power structures

All in all, 2019 was a challenging but successful year for the Center. Our clients deserve the best, and that is exactly what our staff provides. Working with such a wide range of diverse populations requires a level of knowledge, cultural awareness, compassion, and respect. This is a high benchmark to meet, yet we meet it – year after year. We look forward to what the future will bring!




