OUR TRANSITION FROM A PROGRAM TO SERVICE MODEL

As 2022 came to a close, we celebrated the successful restructuring of the Center for Nonviolence (CfN) service delivery model. The program-based model, consisting of Men's Collective, Women's Collective, and Youth Collective, transitioned to a services-based model: Intervention Collective, Support and Advocacy Collective, and Prevention and Youth Services Collective. This transition has allowed us to move forward in a more gender-inclusive way, expanding our scope of services and enhancing our staff's capacity to fulfill our vision of creating homes, communities, and a world free from violence and oppression.

Our commitment to justice and liberation shone brightly in 2022 as we continued to deepen our involvement in the community. We attended and hosted a diverse range of community events and workshops throughout Northeast Indiana, allowing us to engage with so many people and their families. Our dedicated team of CfN staff, volunteers, and Coordinating Panel members (BoD) collectively contributed over 200 hours to community engagement efforts alone.

In response to the 2022 reversal of Roe v. Wade, we established a task force to ensure that both staff and clients had access to accurate information and resources to make informed decisions during these challenging times. This commitment to providing essential support and navigating unprecedented challenges reflects the spirit of activism that has always been at the heart of the CfN.

Despite the challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic, we are thrilled to announce that we have resumed the development of several programming initiatives this year. These include our highly anticipated adult LGBTQ+ and adult Black women's support groups, which will provide invaluable resources and support to our community. In addition, our dedicated Prevention Collective has taken steps to revamp and reestablish Youth Support, offering children of clients attending support groups engaging and enriching programming.

Looking ahead, we plan to continue expanding our services and prioritizing important conversations around nonviolence and equity in Fort Wayne and beyond. Over 2,000 families were impacted by our work this year, and we are honored to continue serving even more in 2023.

Support and Advocacy Collective

Our advocates follow best practices established by the Duluth Model and the Indiana Coalition Against Domestic Violence. In 2022, we served 577 survivors by providing legal, medical, and other forms of advocacy.



Intervention Collective

Our intervention programs help participants look deeply at their use of violence, challenge the cultural beliefs that lead them to use violence, and learn how to practice honesty, accountability, and power-sharing. Our team of Indiana Coalition Against Domestic Violence certified facilitators are supervised by senior staff members and monitored regularly by victim advocates. In 2022, we welcomed Shelby Schuld, (Program Administration) to the collective.

Men's Intervention served 244 clients, primarily virtually, with limited in-person services.

In 2022, groups focused primarily on themes from the **Duluth Equality Wheel including** topics such as "Negotiation and Fairness", "Shared Responsibility", and "Responsible Parenting".

Men's Intervention Outcomes

100% of clients agree that they can apply the things they learned at CfN in their own lives, with 80% strongly agreeing.

100% of clients agree that overall CfN has had a positive impact in their lives, with 90% strongly agreeing.

100% of clients agree that they were treated with respect by CfN staff, with 70% strongly agreeing.

Intervention Collective

Women's Intervention served 41 clients. Groups focused on concepts such as modeling nonviolence to children, family, and in the community; being more intentional in accepting and celebrating differences in others; and engaging in conversations around self-reflection.

Throughout the program, the participants explored gender and gender roles, which prompted them to examine how women are socialized to accept everyday practices as being associated with either male or female roles. They discussed how these roles can be oppressive towards women while benefiting men and perpetuating subtle and overt forms of gender-based discrimination that upholds gender bias.



Women's Intervention Outcomes

91% of clients agree that they can apply the things they learned at CfN in their own lives, with 64% strongly agreeing.

82% of clients agree that overall CfN has had a positive impact on their lives, with 64% strongly agreeing.

91% of the clients agree that they were treated with respect by CfN staff, with 91% strongly agreeing.

Prevention Collective

Our prevention services aim to stop violence before it starts by creating spaces where kids feel safe, supported, and respected. There are three programs that encompass this work: The FACES Nonviolent Leadership Program; the LGBTQ+ Youth Community-Based GSA; and the Youth Support program for the children of survivors who participate in our support and advocacy programs. In 2022, we welcomed Myriam Foster and Irene Avalos to this collective.

The FACES Nonviolent Leadership
Program is a school and community-based program that focuses on changing the perception of who is or isn't a leader.
FACES facilitators work with youth on challenging the social norms that fuel violence, which lays the foundation for change in our communities.

In 2022 we worked with 289 students in Fairfield Elementary, Levan Scott Academy, Irwin Elementary, and McMillen Summer Program.

I have learned that when I get mad, I could calm down and take deep breaths and be nice.

Respect others, don't bully others, be kind, learn from mistakes, talk it out.



FACES Outcomes

At the end of the program, 82% of youth expressed disagreeing with the rigid gender norms.

At the end of the program, 92% of students were able to speak to and identify the dangers of adhering to gender norms, power norms, and/or violence norms.

At the end of the program, 95% of students believed they are a positive leader.

Prevention Collective

LGBTQ+ Youth Support is our community-based GSA (Gender & Sexualities Alliance) offering a safe and affirming space for LGBTQ+ youth and allies to explore issues impacting their lives, such as identity and expression. We served 23 youth in this group, which meets weekly.

LGBTQ+ Youth Support Outcomes

93% of clients agree that they can apply the things they learned at CfN in their own lives, with 72% strongly agreeing.

93% of clients agree that overall CfN has had a positive impact in their lives, with 86% strongly agreeing.

100% of clients agree that they were treated with respect by CfN staff.

Youth Support had been on hiatus for the past two years due to COVID-19. We were so pleased to be able to provide this specific programming to 52 children whose mothers are participating in our Latinx support group.

Bringing in similar concepts from our FACES program, this "childcare" option has helped increase the Mujeres Unidas (Women United) Latinx support group attendance.


